## Abstract of Master's Thesis of Academic Year 2013

Sound Gardening: a Garden Microenvironment for User-generated

Narrative

The aim of this research is to transform a living garden in to a microenvironment for narrative production. The design, Sound Gardening, took the form an indoor garden augmented with sensors and a system of speaker outputs. Garden-to-human interactions led users to conceptualize the garden as a microenvironment in which to stage their own stories. Without any recognizable landscape the design relies on its non-visual interactions to facilitate narrative creation among its users. The process of story creation is represented in three chronological elements of the design, intervention, exploration and discovery, and user-generated narrative. In a unique contrast to existing plant media research Sound Gardening focuses on a holistic garden interaction rather than a singular plant to human interaction.
